

Compassion During Covid-19

Reflecting back over the past year, one of the hardest challenges for everyone at the Winnipegosis and District Health Centre through the pandemic have been around the restrictions to visitations and socially distant rules, and how it has disconnected us from those to whom we would usually turn to in times of stress and sickness (our close family and friends). In March 2020, as the first cases of COVID were announced in Manitoba, the first “No Visitors Allowed” posters went up. Phone calls were made to families that stopped all visitation and social activities in the personal homes and transitional unit. “Do what you have to do, we have to keep our elders safe” was encouraged by everyone.

With the support of our community, we were able to purchase a few extra iPads. The Activity Director explained how she cried the first few times she witnessed Facetime calls between a resident and family. She ensured calls were made regularly for many residents who missed their loved ones.

As normal activities programs were halted or changed to ensure social distancing and infection and prevention rules could be applied, the staff became creative in how to continue with some of the programs that everyone loved. For Bingo, cards were laminated, tables set up in hallways, and the game was slowed down so that everyone can hear the caller, and wipe down all cards, bingo dabbers, etc. Smart TVs have been installed, so that computers and iPads can be connected, ensuring that more than one person can see a virtual mass, program, etc.

How does compassion live with our personal care home and transitional unit, especially during a pandemic? It has been demonstrated moment after moment, from all the staff, through all of this time. When masks became mandatory, the activity director would print out a large picture of herself as a badge so that residents would see her face. The staff would try their best to smile through the mask, continue to laugh, talk (a little bit louder now) and be present with the residents, as they knew they were the only people whom the residents and clients saw in person now. Even in the dining room, when residents had to spread out, staff ensured that they would take the time to talk and visit with each one, as table mates were moved away from each other.

Connection, community and compassion are at the heart of everything we do.

The Winnipegosis and District Health Centre has been providing health care for the residents of Winnipegosis and its surrounding area for over 80 years.

The Winnipegosis and District Health Centre, operating within Prairie Mountain Health, provides a licensed personal care home services for 20 individuals with access to nursing, pharmacy, nutrition support, recreation, medical, and spiritual care services.

The 14-bed, accredited hospital (currently a transitional care unit), features nurse-managed care for people waiting placement for a personal care home; respite; convalescent care; palliative care; and a bathing service for people in the community who require assistance.

The Winnipegosis and District Health Centre also houses Dr. Carleton's Medical Clinic.

As well, the Centre offers access to MBTelehealth service, and people in the community can access various health and social services, including home care, public health, mental health, limited diagnostic services, dietitian services, Addictions Foundation of Manitoba services, and chronic disease education.
